## Where have all of the shops gone?

"WHERE have all our neighbours gone? Gone to the supermarket everyone!" said a local newspaper report in October — "Two developers suffered another defeat at St Austell as town centre and green belt defenders rejected their multi- million schemes."

Late last year two town councils, Wadebridge and St Austell, vigorously opposed plans for out-oftown trading developments, by so doing protecting town centre businesses, and stemming the present trend for shoppers to travel by car to supermarkets placed at some distance from their homes.

The degree to which shopping within the neighbourhood has changed to travelling to do shopping, can be seen by the comparison made below of the traders in St Dennis before the war and the town's businesses today.

Out of a total of 116 pupils, two children's parents shop in Truro, five children's parents shop in St Dennis; the rest do their weekly shopping in St Austell.

St Austell's Asda has car parking spaces for over 700 cars; if every space is used on a Saturday, for an hour's shopping, approximately 6,300 cars would use the car park during the day, each having made a journey of some distance, (eg 10 miles from St. Dennis).

A rough indication of the kind of atmospheric pollution all these shoppers cause can be assessed by using the following state-

ment:
"The average car produces 2.7 kgs of hydrocarbons for every 10 gallons of petrol used - these cause photochemical smog and nitrogen oxides linked with respiratory illnesses" -Green magazine.
