2. Musicians I knew and respected

People connected with Church Choir music, Male Voice, Orchestra Individual Instruments. (piano, organ etc.) have given pleasure to many audiences and enhanced one's personal performance. I call to mind St. Dennis people such as that Iteloat; Eddie Williams, Garfield Craddock, Stan Penhaligan, Harold Dunstan, Preston Juleff, Michael Strongman Hugh Camps, All connected with choirs and Sc. Dennis Band. Teachers in our local schools—Miss Williams, Mrs. Beryl Hooper (St. Dennis & Trevisher C.P.-St. Eval) Mr. Tack Schomon Head of Trevisher—son of Mrs. Schomon who formed the Hil Stars Choir. My father—as a Brass Band player with Fochole and Indian Gueens Sciver Band. Numerous youngsters from St. Dennis singing, playing with St. Dennis Band (Youth), St. Dennis School Choir, St. Stophens in Brannel Secondary School Choir, Chapel Choirs.

a) Harold Treloar, Musical Director of St. Dennis Male Voice Choir.

The first occasion I met I tarold was at the Indian Queens Wesley chapel where St. Dennis M. V. Choir was giving a concert

Mus D. Bulloch was the accompanist. I was asked to accompany the choir in the pièce "Thanks be to God." Miss Bullock said to me, "Watch Harold because he pulls the piece round a bit!" I managed to Harold's Satisfaction.

In 1985 I met Handel in Virboria, Vancouver Island, British Columbia, Canada. He had emigrated and I had a Commonwealth Exchange Teaching, experience. He invited Margaret and I to attend the Metropolitian United Church in Victoria where he was Musical Director of the Choir about to visit his home for lunch. The first service I shall always remember as the anthem was sung with professional rendering while later in the scruce I tarold played a secophone solo by Bach. The visit to Harold's home was repeated on a number of occasions. He extended to me an unvitation to sing with the gowned choir. I did so on one occasion as school was my main commitment.

Itarold also constructed the Arion M. V. Choir and I was a festimate to altered one of their rehearsals. Winnie, Itarold's wife commented, "Not like So Dennis M. V. Choir! I was chairman to the St. Columb and Pads tow Methodist Youth Rally. Margaret song in the Youth Rally Choir on several occasions under Ms. G. Roseveare, also Carne Itill Methodist Chapel Choir. During the Easter the Crusaders visited hondon for the Methodist Youth Weekend in the Hibert Itall and it was there that our friendship developed!

After National Service and college at St. huke's, Exeter I gained a teaching pool at St. Dennis All Age School and during our courting days sang in the chapel choir under Mr. Garfield Craddock. Garfield had a wonderful barilone voice, taking over the choir when Mr. Stanley Trebat retried. He was the Yalker of I tarold Trebat. Cantatas and anthems were the order of the day. My experience of church music was widened from the menu of Church music at St. huke's Cottege (Cg E). The choir was fortunate in having members in all parts able to take solos

3 when necessary while teenage youngsters added youthful voices to the nature adults. "Givet Divine" was the cantata chosen for the Itarvest Fastival in 1954. This stood me in good stead when asked to conduct Queens Wesley Chair in 1958. Our dose association with Came Hill Choir ended when Living at Indian Queens. Band playing. Gillian entered Local Music Festivals and often
played in the various age groups. Music Festivals such as Indian
Duesas, Roche, Bugle and Wadelridge had brass sections as did
local bands. Here there was competition between young sters. I
accompanied Gillian on the piano and could tune the instrument
to the piano. Mr. Penhaligan was often present; and not being a
brass player myself, would leave the final tuning to him.
Iam sure that some of the prizes won by Gillian were due to his
expertise in the final sound produced, also the precision of Mr.
Williams teaching

Gillian played with the Cornwall Youth Band, The Youth Band of Great Britain and the flute with the Wind Band of Great Britain. The standard of teaching in Cornwall must have been

good!



Due to our commitments we did Elijah. not attend every week but anthems I remember were Mar 24th The hegend by Take kowsky (unaccompanied) Marion. Onward Christian Soldiers Andlews and Introits were sung at all mothing services.

The standard was esctremely high - Itarold used his calent on a world platy orm!!

f) Some Senior Si Dennis Band Known to me and of similar age. Michael Strongmom, Hugh Camps, Desmond Angilley, Harold Dunstan, Kenneth Ficher.

Orchael Strongman and Hugh Comps I met at Newguay Grammar School for Boys, Michael was in the same class as myself and our teacher started an orchestra. The Maths teacher baught us the vidin, the Geography teacher accompanied on the piano. I played second violin, while Michael and Itugh prairied the brass section with a player from Wearyn East Band. Both boys played with the Senior Band for a number of years. Itugh Camps went on to conduct Bude Band and truter Community Youth Band. Neither are living to day, but I (reasure the playing of Handels Water Klusic, overtures like Zampa, Buigh of Baghold, Asim the G. String, all played as young sters and trained by amaleur musicians in addition to their normal subjects.

Desmond Angilley began his careet with Indian Queens Bund and played under a number of conductors. His son went to music college and has played the point for celebrated musicians.

Kenneth Tucker, kept up the family tradition of trass band playing.

Tack Solomon believed that children would rise to the occasion. It was a colour feel character who could inspere a staff and willing to use local people to achieve the aims for his school.

c) Sc. Scephens - in - Brannel - Secondary School. - 1962 - 1964

Sc. Dennis Children contributed to the musical life of the school.

They became founds' members of the school choir surging under Mr. H. Dumn (Music treacher each Sc. Stephens C. P. School) and accompanist while I conducted the choir. This choir sangat the fist Prije Day for the School. See programme in "Looking Back at-St. Dennis and Sc. Stephens Schools" - St. Dennis web site.

ells Jucobs taught Margaret, my wife, in St. Dennes School. They lived in Trelavour Road and Mr. Jacobs built his own organ. They moved to Bristol for his work and a boy was both there.

While headteacher of Bustation C.P. School the Governors and myself interviewed a teacher for a music post as well as a general class teacher I required a pianist but had had leachers of music who were unable to play the piano with confidence. I set the interview up so that each cardiclate played a set hymn-This was, "Jesus I have promised "to the modern bune. Governors were invited to listen to the rendering as sight reading was an important Usue, Candidates on the whole struggled with

Margaret, as school secretary, provided all with tea and viscuits. One candidate remarked that she had a "Cornish accent;" She sald to him that he would not know the area or village she came from.

Yes I do, my mother and father came from St. Dennis and

lived in Trelavour Road!

Margaret realised it was Edward Jacobs. I did not know this as the formal interview had begun and there was nothing on his documentation to indicate a link with 50. Dennis,

Edward gave a robust performance of the piece of music set and was far better than anyone who played. I did not know his background but knew the teacher I required! He laught-ut. Burraton C.P. until l'relited in 1994 and only finished there in 2019. He built the musical tradition of the school with his enthus casm for all types of music. His accompanying was of a high order and electric.

Finale In recent years Mr 6 Ms. W. Sheaff come to live in Sallash (5) and we worshipped at the same church He continued his local preaching and often led the group to visit the Tamar Newsing Itomes dt was a pleasure to join this group and accompany any musical items.
